Service Theme RETHINKING SUFFERING UNDER THE CROSS

We know that the cross was an instrument of torture and execution. However, Scripture also uses the term "cross" to refer to any suffering that one endures because he is a believer: the painful denial of the desires of the flesh; ridicule and persecution from unbelievers; etc. This is one reason people reject religion. They see Christians struggling in life with these crosses, while non-Christians often seem perfectly happy. Even the prophet Jeremiah asked, "Why do all the faithless live at ease?" (12:1). Today, Jesus asks us to rethink suffering under the cross. It is not pointless pain. Our crosses are not how we pay for sin. Jesus already did that on his cross. Our crosses are not redemptive, but they are constructive. Any suffering unbelievers face is only bad, a foretaste of worse to come. But the suffering believers face under the cross is only good, a way Christ connects us tightly to himself with fire-tested faith.

1st Lesson

Job 1:13-22 (EHV)

Job is given a heavy cross, but it does not crush his faith. Instead, God uses Job's cross to move Job to worship and praise the LORD.

¹³One day when Job's sons and daughters were eating and drinking wine in the house of their oldest brother, ¹⁴a messenger came to Job and said, "The oxen were plowing and the female donkeys were grazing nearby, ¹⁵when the Sabeans swooped down and took them away. They put the servants to death with the sword, and I am the only one who has escaped to tell you!"

¹⁶While he was still speaking, another servant came and said, "The fire of God fell from the sky and burned up the flocks and the servants and consumed them, and I am the only one who has escaped to tell you!"

¹⁷While he was still speaking, another servant came and said, "The Chaldeans formed three raiding parties and plundered the camels and took them away. They put the servants to death with the sword, and I am the only one who has escaped to tell you!"

¹⁸While he was still speaking, another servant came and said, "Your sons and daughters were eating and were drinking wine in the house of their oldest brother. ¹⁹Suddenly a powerful wind swept in from the wilderness and struck the four corners of the house, and it collapsed on the young people, and they died, and I am the only one who has escaped to tell you!"

²⁰Then Job stood up, tore his robe, and shaved his head. He fell to the ground and worshipped. ²¹Then he said, "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I will return. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away. May the name of the LORD be blessed."

²²In all this, Job did not sin or blame God.

Psalm 73

(Read Responsively)

M: A psalm by Asaph.

C: ¹Surely God is good to Israel, to the pure in heart.

M: ²But as for me, my feet almost slipped out from under me.

C: I almost lost my footing.

M: ³I even envied the arrogant when I observed the peace of the wicked.

C: ⁴For there are no struggles at their death. Their bodies are sturdy.

M: ⁵They do not have the trouble common to people. They are not plaqued along with the rest of mankind.

C: ⁶Therefore pride is their necklace. They wear violence like clothing.

M: ⁷Their eyes bulge out of their fat. The schemes of their hearts step over boundaries.

C: 8They mock. They speak maliciously. From a high perch they threaten oppression.

- M: ⁹They set their mouths against the heavens. Their tongues strut around on earth.

- M: ¹⁵If I had said, "I will speak like this," I would certainly have betrayed the circle of your children.
- C: ¹⁶When I tried to understand this, it was very troubling to me,
- M: ¹⁷until I went to the sanctuary of God. Then I understood their end.
- C: ¹⁸Surely you place them on slippery places. You cause them to fall into destruction.
- M: ¹⁹How quickly they come to ruin, completely destroyed by terrors! ²⁰They are like a dream when someone wakes up.
- C: So when you arise, O Lord, you will despise them like an illusion.
- M: ²¹Yes, my heart was bitter, and I was torn up inside.
- C: ²²I was unthinking and ignorant. I was a dumb animal before you.
- M: ²³Yet I am always with you. You hold me by my right hand.
- C: ²⁴With your guidance you lead me, and afterward, you will take me to glory.
- M: ²⁵Who else is there for me in heaven? And besides you, I desire no one else on earth.
- C: ²⁶My flesh and my heart fail, but God is the rock of my heart and my portion forever.

M: ²⁷No doubt about it! Those who are far from you will perish. You destroy all who commit adultery against you.

C: ²⁸As for me, God's nearness is good for me. I have made the LORD God my refuge, so that I can tell about all your works. Amen.

Second Lesson

Romans 5:1-11 (EHV)

St. Paul teaches that God works through our suffering to shape our Christian character and to lead us to cling to Christ's gracious promises.

Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. ²Through him we also have obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand. And we rejoice confidently on the basis of our hope for the glory of God.

³Not only this, but we also rejoice confidently in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces patient endurance, ⁴and patient endurance produces tested character, and tested character produces hope. ⁵And hope will not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, who was given to us.

⁶For at the appointed time, while we were still helpless, Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷It is rare indeed that someone will die for a righteous person. Perhaps someone might actually go so far as to die for a person who has been good to him. ⁸But God shows his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

⁹Therefore, since we have now been justified by his blood, it is even more certain that we will be saved from God's wrath through him. ¹⁰For if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, it is even more certain that, since we have been reconciled, we will be saved by his life. ¹¹And not only is this so, but we also go on rejoicing confidently in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received this reconciliation.

Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. (Mark 8:34)

Gospel Lesson

Mark 8:31-38 (EHV)

Jesus teaches of the absolute necessity of the cross, both his and ours.

³¹Jesus began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things; be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the experts in the law; be killed; and after three days rise again. ³²He was speaking plainly to them. Then Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But after turning around and looking at his disciples. Jesus rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! You do not have your mind set on the things of God, but the things of men."

³⁴He called the crowd and his disciples together and said to them, "If anyone wants to follow me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. 35 For whoever wants to save his life will lose it. But whoever loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶After all, what good is it for a man to gain the whole world and yet forfeit his soul? 37Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul? 38In fact, whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will also be ashamed of him when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."
